Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values has the general objective of protecting and promoting the rights and values enshrined in the Treaties, the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union and the applicable international human rights conventions, in particular by supporting organizations of civil society and other stakeholders active at local, regional, national and transnational levels, as well as fostering democratic and civic participation, in order to promote and further develop open, rights-based, democratic, equal and inclusive societies, founded in the rule of law.

Networks of Towns will give towns and municipalities the possibility to deepen and intensify their cooperation and debate, develop sustainable networks and outline their long-term vision for the future of European integration.

"Strengthening European Identity in times of crisis" is a project of Network of Towns framed in "Citizens, Equality, Rights and values" programme, promoted by the City Council of Padrón, Spain, whose main objective is to promote the sense of belonging to the EU, offer the opportunity to know EU Citizenship's rights, our common values and democratic norms to all citizens of different European realities, as well as reinforcing mutual understanding through intercultural dialogue and support good local governance for an optimal role in the Europe of the Future.

In cooperation of partners from 16 countries, the project will be carried out around 5 thematic meetings in five different cities: Padrón (Spain), Burdeos (Francia), Hal Kirkop (Malta), Andrychow (Poland) and Kekava (Latvia); in which more than 5000 people will participate directly and indirectly, guaranteeing equal access, without any type of scrimination, ensuring equality between genders and also offering the opportunity to citizens who have never been involved in similar projects. In line with the objectives and priorities of the CERV programme, the project will focus on promoting active participation at local and european level, by carring out activities with an innovative methodology: data collection, focus groups, workshops, EU storytelling, cultural visits or exhibitions. It is also intended to bring together young people, who will eventually have a greater knowledge of political processes, institutions and history of the European Union, adressing current issues.

All of this will generate a great impact on citizens since it offers municipalities of all sizes the opportunity to develop and participate in these types of projects and forge true and lasting bonds of friendship between them. One of them was the expansion of the economic activity zone. The goal of this project was the preparation of investment areas enabling the construction of industrial and service facilities with access to technical infrastructure and transport of the city. Today, top companies have their headquarters here, such as Ogniochron – producing fire extinguishers for the international arena or CMC. More and more entrepreneurs want to invest in Andrychów and more plants are under construction. There is also a shopping mall with top store brands. The inhabitants of the Municipality benefited not only in terms of consumption, but also in terms of new job places.

By the subsidy from the European Union, many recreational and sports investments have been created in the Commune, such as the Flow Park in Sułkowice, the roller skating track in Zagórnik, or the latest investment opened last year, i.e. the Antecki Pond with paths around Pańska Mountain. The goal was to encourage outdoor activity and provide a place to do so. It has also become a perfect place for the integration of residents during organized competitions of cycling, canoeing or running, as well as a place for school classes in the field of natural sciences, art and physical education. There is also a psychiatric hospital nearby, where patients can take outdoor activities.

The Union has also helped to create the Municipal Transport Network. The local public transport project allowed for the purchase of buses, the reconstruction of bus stop infrastructure and the adaptation of technical facilities. Residents can move safely and freely throughout the Commune.

Because the Union, students of our schools can take part in inter-school exchanges, learning about new cultures and traditions. Such projects give them the opportunity to explore a new world and open up to it, make many friends and gain unforgettable memories and experiences.

The EU also helps us support our environment and ecology, by co-financing a project to replace heat sources in individual households in the Andrychów Commune. The subject of the project/investment was the replacement of old solid fuel heating sources with new ones in the form of gas boilers and biomass boilers, heat pumps along with the execution of internal installations. As a result, many residents have replaced their heating furnaces, which has contributed, for example, to improving air quality.

The list of investments is endless, there are many new projects and ideas on how to improve our little homeland. There is only one conclusion – acting together, in concert, the EU countries have more clout and opportunities for development than each of them individually. Together we can do more.

THE IMPACT OF THE EUROPEAN UNION ON PEOPLE'S EVERYDAY LIFE IN HUNGARY

Hungary joined the European Union on May 1, 2004 with great hopes. My personal experience is that after the system change in Hungary in the early 1990s, my class teacher at the time talked with great enthusiasm about our opportunities following our entry into the EU. Almost 14 years later, we joined. We noticed that on



May 2, 2004, after all, nothing happened in our everyday life. I would also like to continue with a personal experience. In June 2004, I experienced the first impact of the Union on my daily life for the first time, because during a car trip in the Czech Republic, we had an accident in which, fortunately, we were not injured, and our car was damaged, and the insurance process was incredibly smooth. cross-border administration between insurance companies, because from June 2004, if I remember correctly, the systems of the insurance companies of the EU member states were connected.

From the point of view of Hungarian people, the entry into the Schengen area, which took place on November 15, 2007, was also a big step in their everyday life. A sad historical memory of Hungary, which is a painful memory for Hungarians to this day, despite the fact that generations have grown up, is the Trianon decision of June 4, 1920, when 2/3 of the Hungarian native-speaking population was trapped outside the Hungarian borders during World War I. regarding defeat. The descendants of these families have retained their Hungarian identity to this day, even though they were integrated as citizens of their new countries. From this point of view, it was important for the Hungarians that the members of families separated by the borders of the countries entered the Schengen area and it became easier to maintain contact.

Employment in Western Europe was also important for Eastern European countries in terms of stimulating the economy and in connection with the financial development of the families of these countries. At one time, they joked in Hungary that London was the 6th most populous Hungarian city, because so many foreign workers lived in London. Since then, the United Kingdom is no longer a member of the EU. Perhaps nowadays there is a tendency that employees who worked abroad are trying to move back to Hungarian enterprises.

As the "black sheep", Hungary's situation now goes against the main direction of the EU in many respects, but also because of the above, Hungary has no intention of living outside the EU, and ordinary people also experience the infrastructural and other developments that our country got this by joining the EU.

Eastern European countries, including Slovakia, joined the European Union on May 1, 2004 with great hope. Those of us who grew up in the Soviet-style "democracy" were already looking forward to the opening to the West, which opened up the entire Western



civilized world to us. There were three important pillars of joining that radically changed our lives. First of all, there was the free flow of labour, which made possible for the workers, who often only worked for minimum wages here, excellent professionals, to get jobs for fair wages in the surrounding Western European countries, primarily in Austria and Germany, but also in the more distant England. The second major change in our lives was the opening of the Schengen borders in December 2007, when we could travel throughout the European Union without a passport, without anyone stopping us at the border. This was perhaps one of the most important results of joining the EU. The third important moment of our amalgamation to the EU was Slovakia's entry to the monetary union, when on January 1, 2009, the Slovak crown was replaced by the euro. In the former Eastern Bloc, apart from Slovakia, Slovenia and Croatia introduced this currency, the other member countries like Hungary, Romania, the Czech Republic and Poland, have vet to do so. Obviously, this is primarily an economic issue, since the introduction of the euro is a very serious financial and economic decision that has consequences. Since joining the European Union, we have been able to visit many countries of Europe, where we got to know other cultures, people, languages and customs, and we saw how diverse, modern, rich history and past Europe has. This was thanks to the tenders and grants provided by the EU, within the framework of which we made countless friendships. Thanks to European Union subsidies, Slovakia and the surrounding countries of the former Eastern Bloc have undergone enormous development. This is visible. New roads, bridges, utilities were built; historical monuments and buildings were renovated and built in each region of Slovakia. Joining the EU is, from our point of view, a very determining factor in our lives. and it is also one of the keys to development and common thinking in our future.

The European Unionhas emerged as a transformative force in my life, particularly as women living in a crossborder. This project marks my inaugural participation in a European program that brings together individuals from 17 different nationalities, an experience that holds immense promise for personal and communal growth.

Living in a crossborder city as Turnu Magurele, the significance of the EU becomes abundantly clear. The prospect of Romania's

inclusion in the Schengen space, as outlined in the new agreement, presents a host of opportunities for someone in my position. A good bet for the EU was the Erasmus + program, which allows students to be more successful in their personal and professional lives and helps universities to become more innovative. This program is open to young people, students, interns, teachers and people working in the field of education, as well as volunteers from around the world.

Traveling in Europe has also become much easier than it used to be because most EU countries, and some third countries, have abolished border controls between them through the Schengen Agreement.

Younger children also receive support through the European Child Guarantee, which is a program aimed at combating social exclusion and poverty through education, healthcare, nutrition and housing.

In conclusion, the EU contributed to improving the lives of the Portuguese people.

Last year, my wife and I made a round trip through several EU-Countries by car. We met each other in Bordeaux.

We were able to grow up in peace, wars were far away. But due to the conflicts around the Ukraine and Israel wars have come closer to the European Union.

I think at present it is most important for all of us to preserve peace by way of unity and to put aside smaller national interests. I support this with my daily work and in conversations, because I am more for dialogue instead of sending weapons.

I live in one of the central boroughs of Berlin, in Friedrichshain-Keuzberg. This district is considered a hotspot for young people from all over Europe. You can hear almost all European languages on the streets, shops, restaurants and in clubs. Young people from all over the EU live and work here.

I have been working for many years in a non-profit organization that organizes internships abroad for young trainees in Europe. They gain experiences in living together abroad, they get to know the working methods in their trades and professions in their neighbouring countries. This way they reduce their fears, create tolerance and understanding, they understand each other better.

The "Erasmus plus" programme is one of the best results of the EU's work benefits everyone.

However, things have become restless in Europe. Migration and wars cause problems. National interests, different interpretations and also wrong decisions put cohesion in the EU to the test.

Ich lebe in einem der zentralen Stadtbezirke Berlins, in Friedrichshain-Kreuzberg. Er gilt gegenwärtig als ein Hotspot des Jugend Europas, man hört auf den Straßen, Plätzen und Clubs fast alle europäischen Sprachen, hier arbeiten und wohnen junge Menschen aus ganz Europa.

Ich arbeite seit vielen Jahren in einem gemeinnützigen Verein, der für junge Auszubildenden Auslandspraktika in Europa organisiert. Sie sammeln Erfahrungen im Zusammenleben in Ausland, lernen die Arbeitsweise in ihren Berufen und Traditionen in unseren Nachbarländern kennen. Dabei werden Ängste abgebaut, Toleranz und Verständnis erzeugt, man versteht einander besser.

- 2. Paying taxes only when doing business in one country. Therefore, for example, when I sell a work of art to a buyer in another country, I do not have to pay double taxes.
- 3. Cultural unification is growing stronger. We create cultural products and invite artists from the EU to visit us. We feel that we are similar; we are like a cultural medium with a chance to know each other.
- 4. Food product standards. If you buy your favourite coffee in Lithuania, you can expect the same coffee in Germany to taste the same.
- 5. The EU legal framework strongly affects Lithuanian law. The law is becoming more humane, advisory rather than punishable. For example, the tax inspectorate advises residents first, rather than punishing them.
- 6. EU nature protection requirements have improved the situation in Lithuania. In particular, the water quality is improving.
- 7. European projects have a significant impact on the economy in the state and municipalities. Projects partially financed by the EU help local businesses to increase investment, expand and change the range of goods and services.
- 8. As a single economic space, the EU helps local entrepreneurs to find new markets and sales channels that have not previously been available or difficult to access.
- 9. The European Union informs citizens of current issues in the EU through communication channels, such as Euronews, and we do not live at municipal or state level.
- 10. The EU is influencing our cultural mindset. We are watching more European theatres, dances, and films, as well as organising international festivals. It is important to reduce Hollywood and Russian production.

The European Green Deal sets out how we can make Europe the

first climate-neutral continent by 2050. To achieve this goal, we must work towards a clean, circular economy, restore biodiversity and reduce pollution. All sectors must participate in this, and that means, for example:

- investing in environmentally friendly technology
- help companies innovate
- provide cleaner, cheaper and healthier private and public transport
- decarbonize the energy sector
- ensure greater energy efficiency of buildings
- work with international partners to improve global environmental standards.

The EU wants to be climate neutral by 2050 and wants to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by at least 55% below 1990 levels by 2030. The very first European climate law will put these goals in black and white and ensure that the EU contributes to them in all policy areas.

This requires significant investments from both the EU and governments in the Member States, but also from the private sector. With the European Green Deal investment plan, the EU is allocating at least EUR 1 trillion for sustainable investments, and with the Just Transition Mechanism, it is not leaving any region behind; at least $\pounds 55$ billion will be spent on targeted measures in the most affected regions. The climate is addressed in all major EU funding programmes; at least 30% of the 2021–2027 budget will go to climate measures.

Underpinning the European Green Deal is the ambition to halt and reverse biodiversity loss by transforming our food systems, our use of forests, land, water and sea, and our energy sector, cities and industry. The EU's new industrial strategy will help European industry lead the twin transitions towards climate neutrality and digital leadership. Digital technology will also play an important role in the EU's 2050 climate target, for example to optimize energy consumption in agriculture, transport, manufacturing and many other sectors.

Climate change and biodiversity loss are threats to the entire planet, and the EU will continue to lead international efforts for ambitious environmental, climate and energy policies worldwide.

The aims of the European Union within its borders are:

- promote peace, its values and the well-being of its citizens
- offer freedom, security and justice without internal borders, while also taking appropriate measures at its external borders to regulate asylum and immigration and prevent and combat crime
- establish an internal market
- achieve sustainable development based on balanced economic growth and price stability and a highly competitive market economy with full employment and social progress
- protect and improve the quality of the environment
- promote scientific and technological progress
- combat social exclusion and discrimination
- promote social justice and protection, equality between women and men, and protection of the rights of the child
- enhance economic, social and territorial cohesion and solidarity among EU countries
- respect its rich cultural and linguistic diversity
- establish an economic and monetary union whose currency is the euro

The European Union is founded on the following values:

Human dignity

Human dignity is inviolable. It must be respected, protected and constitutes the real basis of fundamental rights.

Freedom

Freedom of movement gives citizens the right to move and reside freely within the Union. Individual freedoms such as respect for private life, freedom of thought, religion, assembly, expression and information are protected by the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights.

Democracy

The functioning of the EU is founded on representative democracy. A European citizen automatically enjoys political rights. Every adult EU citizen has the right to stand as a candidate and to vote in elections to the European Parliament. EU citizens have the right to stand as a candidate and to vote in their country of residence, or in their country of origin.

Equality

Equality is about equal rights for all citizens before the law. The principle of equality between women and men underpins all European policies and is the basis for European integration. It applies in all areas. The principle of equal pay for equal work became part of the Treaty of Rome in 1957.

Rule of law

The EU is based on the rule of law. Everything the EU does is founded on treaties, voluntarily and democratically agreed by its EU countries. Law and justice are upheld by an independent judiciary. The EU countries gave final jurisdiction to the European Court of Justice - its judgments have to be respected by all.

Human rights

Human rights are protected by the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. These cover the right to be free from discrimination on the basis of sex, racial or ethnic origin, religion or belief, disability, age or sexual orientation, the right to the protection of your personal data, and the right to get access to justice.
